Making a Patch-stop for Dark Ground Illumination

Nb. Each objective lens in a set needs its own custom-made stop. I recommend that you start by making a stop for the x10 lens.

- 1. Measure the diameter of the filter carrier immediately below the microscope's sub-stage condenser
- 2. Draw a circle of this diameter with a pair of compasses on a piece of card and cut out the disc.
- 3. Use the disc as a template to cut a disc from a piece of **clear** acetate sheet.

Next, we need to work out the required diameter of a stop (opaque disc) to be fixed in the centre of the clear disc.:

- 4. Make a note of the **numerical aperture** of your x10 objective lens. This is one of the figures engraved on the lens barrel and will be in the region of 0.25.
- 5. Add 10% to this value and then double what you get.

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Example: N.A. = 0.25
+ 10\% = 0.025 = 0.275, say 0.28
x 2 = 0.56
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6. We now need to multiply this figure by the focal length of our condenser - - - say, 20mm:

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0.56 x 20mm = 11.20mm
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- 7. Mark and cut out a disc of this diameter from a piece of opaque card.
- 8. Attach this small, opaque disc to the centre of the disc that you cut from clear acetate sheet. This is best done with a very small blob of "Blutac"; once you have tested your dark-ground stop and made any necessary adjustments to the size of the small, opaque disc, it can be glued in place if you wish.

Using the Dark-ground Stop

- 1. Set up your microscope in the usual way.
- 2. Put the stop in the filter tray just underneath the condenser. If you do not have a filter tray, it is usually possible to fix the stop in position temporarily with two or three pieces of "Blutac" around the perimeter.
- 3. Open the sub-stage iris diaphragm a bit and try adjusting the height of the condenser until you get a satisfactory result.
- 4. [if necessary] Replace the opaque disk with slightly smaller or larger ones; a millimeter or two to the diameter, either way, could make a world of difference!

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
